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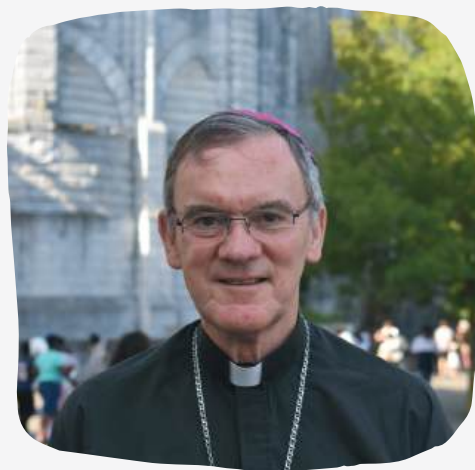

This year is a very important year for Catholics all around the world after Pope Francis announced that we would be having a Holy Year of Jubilee.

A Jubilee is a special celebration that dates back thousands of years to before Jesus was born.

Today, it happens just once every 25 years and is all about making fresh start so we can be better friends with God and each other - as well as being kinder to the world in which we live.

The Jubilee asks us to show our love to one another by giving to different charities, it asks us to think about how we can be kinder to our planet, but most of all, it asks us to get to know God a little better by talking to him more in prayer and learning more about him.

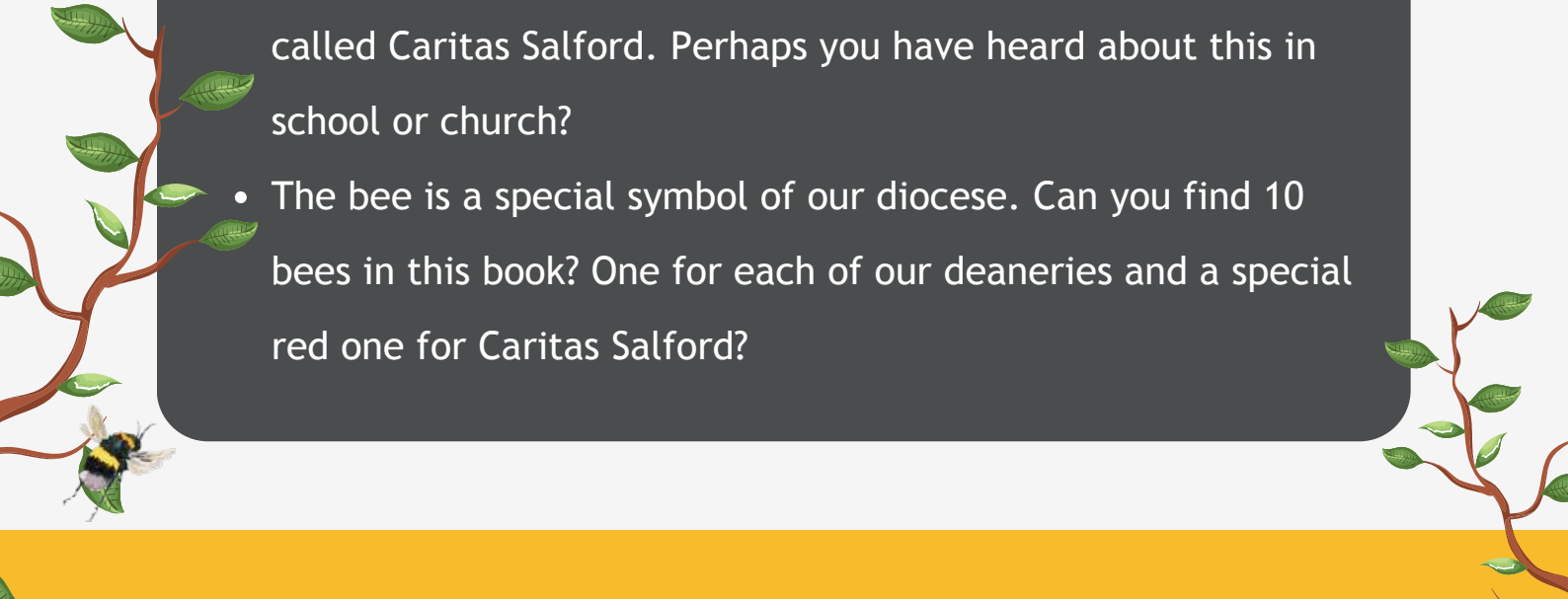
Don't forget to mark your progress by collecting a Jubilee sticker from each of our churches!

- A diocese is a collection of churches, schools, and communities that is connected by our Catholic faith.
 - We have more than 150 churches in our diocese
 - Churches in our diocese are grouped into nine areas called deaneries.
 - We have more than 200 Catholic schools in our diocese. Do you go to one of our Catholic schools?
 - We have almost 300 priests living in our diocese.
 - We have a special priest who looks after our diocese. He is called a bishop and he makes sure all of our churches and schools are running well and sharing our faith.
 - We have a charity that is connected to our diocese. This is called Caritas Salford. Perhaps you have heard about this in school or church?
 - The bee is a special symbol of our diocese. Can you find 10 bees in this book? One for each of our deaneries and a special red one for Caritas Salford?

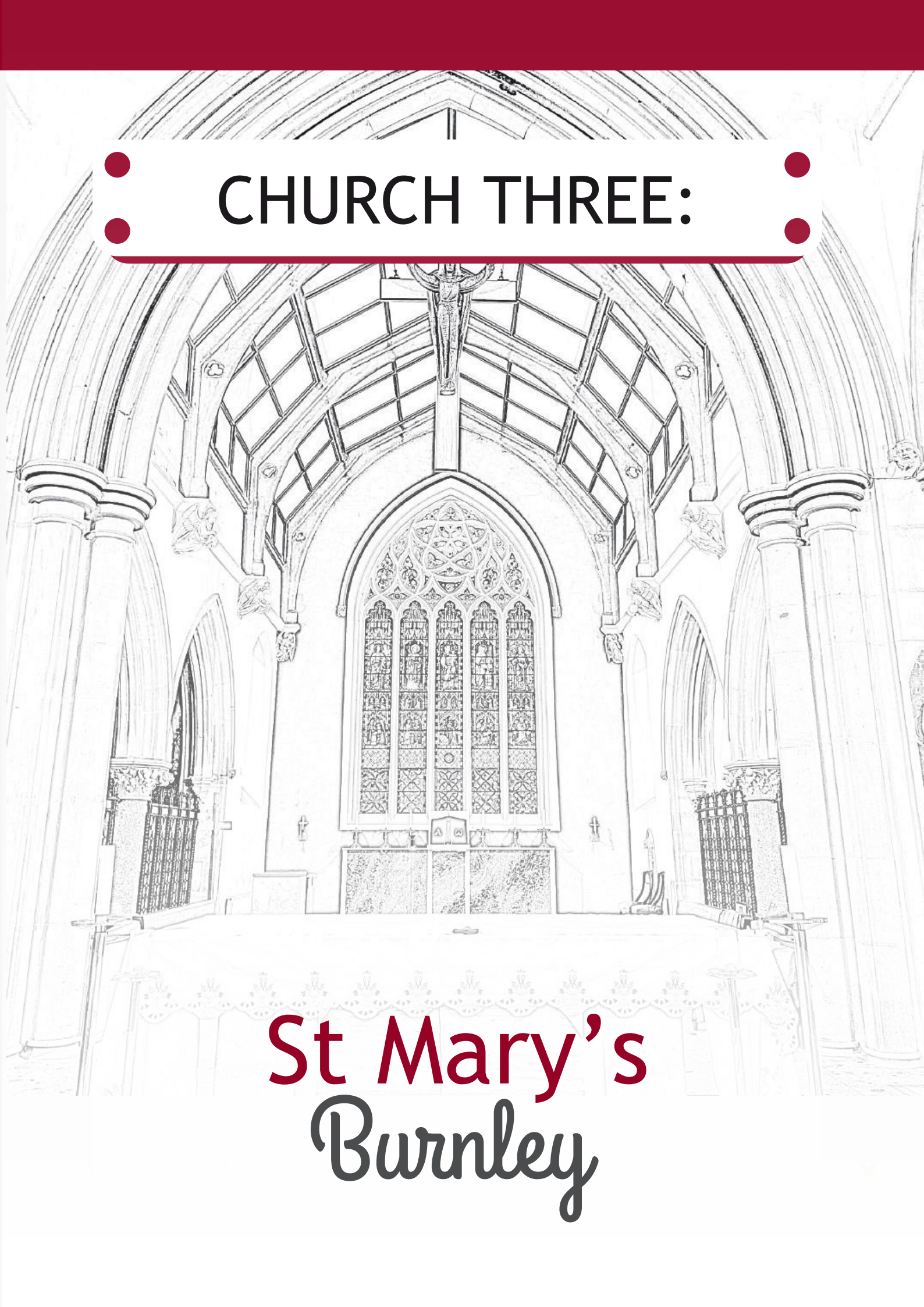

CHURCH THREE:

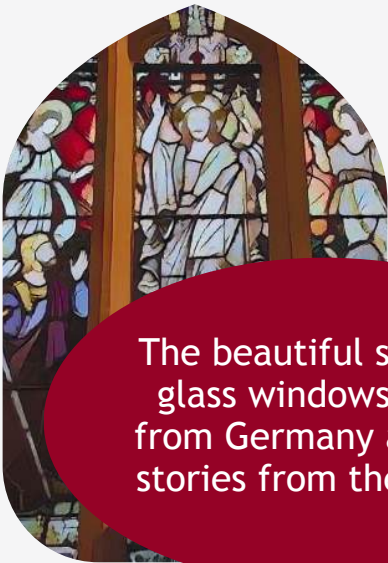
St Mary's

CHURCH FOUR:

St Alban's Blackburn

This is the fourth church in Blackburn dedicated to St Alban. The first opened in 1773.

You can see a picture of St Alban at the end of his life above the tabernacle



The church opened in 1901 - the year Queen Victoria died. That makes it almost 125 years old!



It was built in the Decorated Gothic style, like Westminster Abbey, although that is much older!

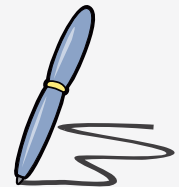

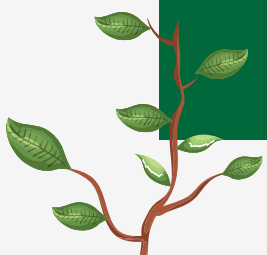

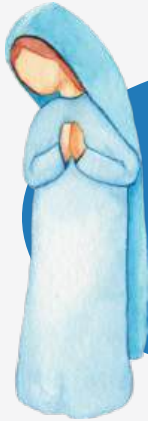


CHURCH FIVE

Hidden Gem Manchester

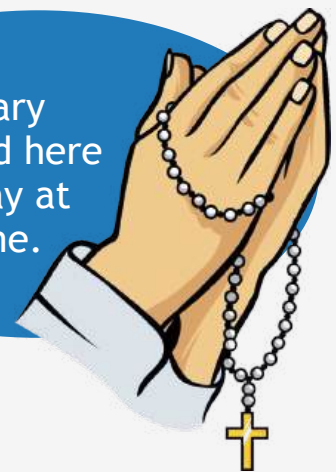

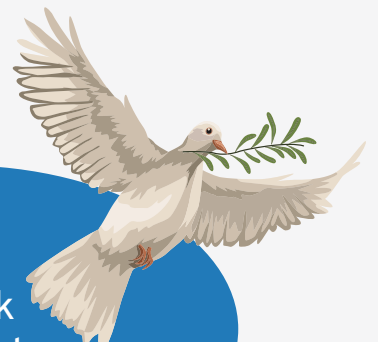
The church has a special connection to Mary as the Shrine of Our Lady of Manchester

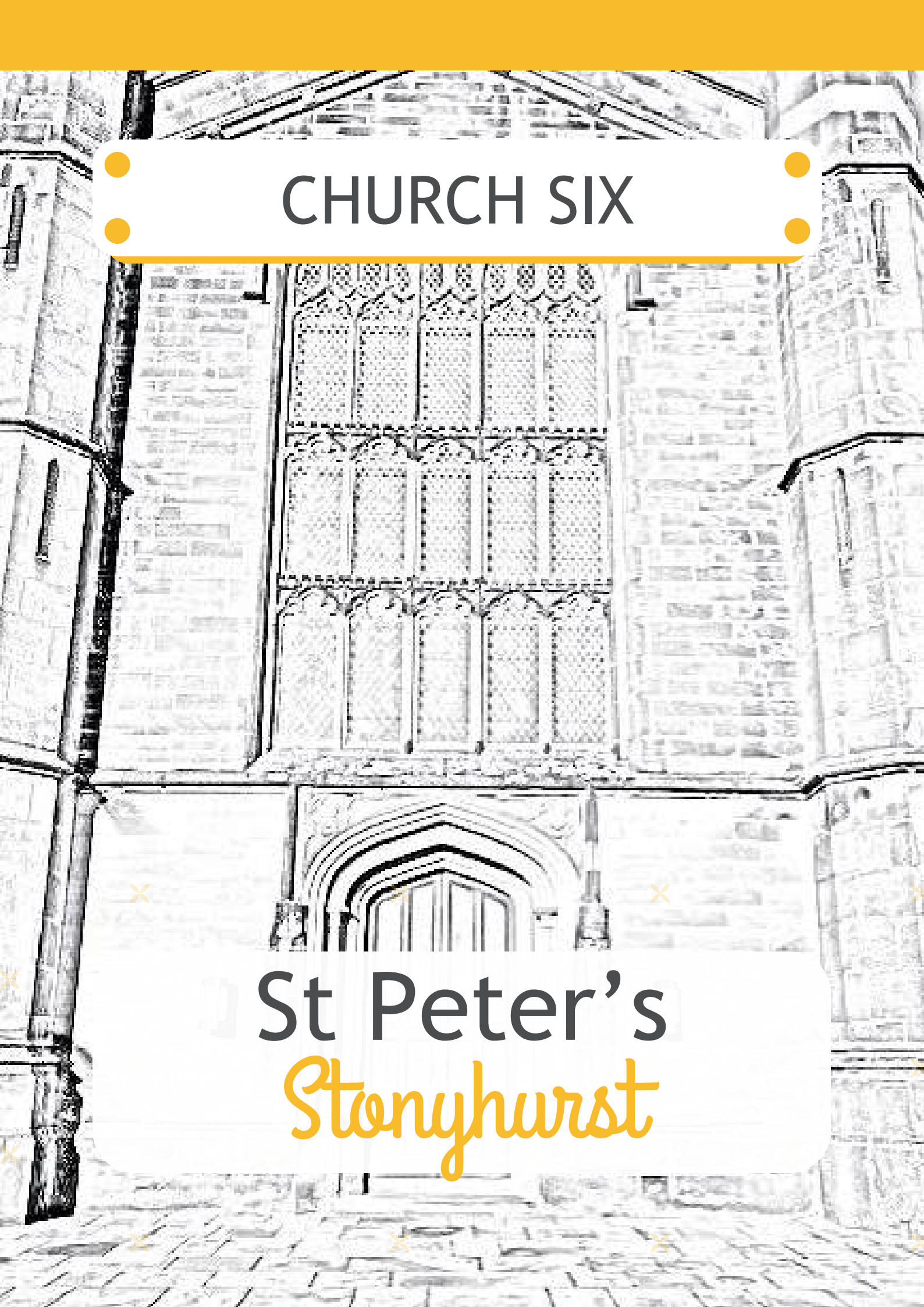

Stonyhurst

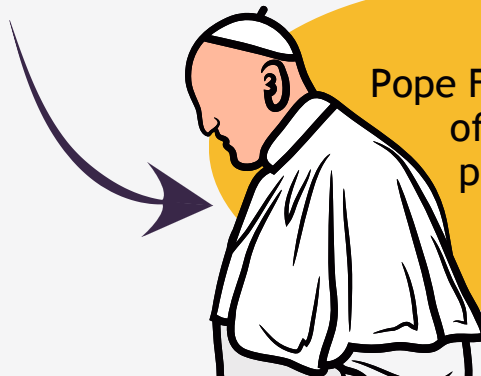

Page 12

1. What is a shrine? A shrine is a church or place that is known as sacred or holy because of a special event that happened there or because of its link to a holy person or saint.
2. What is a covenant? A covenant is a very serious promise between God and his people that joins them together for all time.
3. Who is St Michael? St Michael is one of three archangels, along with Gabriel and Raphael. An archangel is a particular type of angel and we pray to St Michael to help protect us from evil.
4. What is an altar? An altar is a table in the middle of holiest part of the church - called the Sanctuary.
5. What is it for? This is where the bread and wine are blessed and become the Body and Blood of Christ.

Page 14

1. Who is St Benedict? St Benedict is a monk who was born in the Year 480 - that's over 1500 years ago! St Benedict began a special group of monks called the Benedictine Order.
2. A monk is a man who has given his life to God. He lives with other men in a church called a monastery. A bit like a priest, he spends his time praying, reading the Bible, and carrying out different types of jobs.
3. What is a Lady Chapel? A Lady Chapel is a small section of a church or cathedral that is dedicated to Mary, Our Lady Mother.
4. Why do we pray to Mary? Mary is the Mother of Jesus, so is the most special person! As Queen of Heaven, she is very close to Jesus and she passes on our prayers to him and brings us closer to him in everything she does.
5. What is a martyr? A martyr is somebody who has been killed because of their faith in Jesus. They're now with him forever in heaven because of their strong faith.

Page 17

1. What was the reformation? The reformation happened when King Henry VIII began his own Church. People found it very difficult to live their Catholic faith and many sadly died.
2. What is a Catholic feast? It is a celebration! On these days, we remember a particular saint or event.
3. What is the feast of the Assumption? This is a very special feast where we remember Mary being taken up into heaven.
4. It reminds us that Jesus died and rose again so each one of us might follow and join him and his blessed Mother in heaven one day too.
5. Can you find the statue of St Joseph? Why is he carrying lilies? Lilies are a symbol of Mary, who was Joseph's wife. Their white colour means innocence and goodness - just like Mary and Joseph!

Page 20

1. Who is St Alban? Saint Alban is believed to be the first British saint. He lived around 200-300 years after Jesus.
2. Why was he killed? St Alban was beheaded because of his faith in Jesus. Take a moment to thank God that we can live out our faith in peace in our diocese and remember all those around the world who are less fortunate.
3. What is a tabernacle? A tabernacle is a box at the very front of church, near the altar.
4. This is where we find Jesus in our churches. Here, we keep the bread that has been turned into the Body of Christ.

Page 23

1. Can you find the window of Our Lady of Manchester? Head to the Lady Chapel to the right-hand side of the altar to find the stained glass window of Our Lady!
2. What is a Rosary? A Rosary - meaning chain of roses - is a long prayer that tells us about the life of Jesus and his mother, Mary. We pray it using a chain of beads.
3. What prayer do you say most in the Rosary? You pray the Hail Mary 53 times!
4. What happens at baptism? Baptism is when someone is welcomed into the Church - the Body of Christ! The person being baptised - or their parents if they are too young - makes a series of promises to love and worship God. They wear white and are baptised with the Holy Spirit using water and oil.
5. When were you baptised? Can't remember? Ask your family all about that day!

Page 26

1. Who are the Jesuits? The Jesuits are group of priests who have particular focus on mission.
2. Who founded the Jesuits? A Spanish saint called St Ignatius of Loyola began the Jesuits. He was a very spiritual man whose simple way of praying helped people see God in the world around them.
3. What is Stonyhurst College? Stonyhurst College is a school in our diocese. It dates back hundreds of years and has served to educate English Catholics.
4. What are the Stations of the Cross? The Stations of the Cross are series of prayers that help us remember the final hours of Jesus' life and his journey to the cross.
5. Why do we pray them? We pray them to feel closer to Jesus by thinking about all he had to suffer on that final day. Jesus died for us, so it reminds us how much he must love us to do all of that for us.

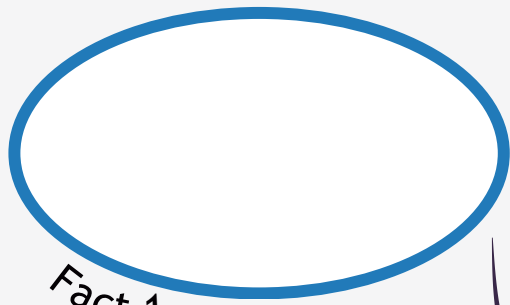
